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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Youth with a Mission (BC) Society

Report on the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Youth with a Mission (BC) Society (the "Society"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2021, and the statements of changes in net assets, operations and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Society as at December 31, 2021, and the results of its operations and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Society in accordance with ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with ASNPO, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Society's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Society or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Society's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to

If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, it such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Society to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

PURPOSE OF THE SOCIETY

The purpose of the Society is to actively involve youth in ministry and outreach work across the world through evangelism, discipleship training, and mercy ministries.

The Society is incorporated under the Societies Act of British Columbia and is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act and as such is exempt from income taxes.

The Society's operations have been significantly affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Although contributions revenue levels have improved and more missions work and training have been able to resume in 2021 over decreased levels in 2020, significant uncertainty still exists. The easing of provincial health restrictions and continuing emergence of new variants could lead to increased infection levels that might require travel and other restrictions to once again be put into place that would negatively affect the Society's missions work in foreign countries and training programs consisting of more Canadian than international students. The effectiveness of vaccines and infection immunity against new variants will determine the degree to which operations will be affected by the pandemic over the next year.

2. RESTRICTED CONTRIBUTIONS ADJUSTMENT

The Society has retrospectively adjusted its financial statements for the recognition of restricted contributions receivable that were previously not accrued in the prior year. In 2020, restricted contributions were received by Youth With A Mission Foundation near year-end but not paid to the Society until early 2021 and as such recorded as revenue in 2021. However, the Society paid the restricted subcontract expenses related to these contributions before the end of 2020 and as such those contributions became receivable for the Society and payable by the Foundation since the restricted use requirements had been fulfilled with only the transfer of cash delayed. As as result, the amount should have been recorded as an accrued receivable and the related revenue recognized.

To account for this adjustment in the current year, opening net assets increased by \$508,049 and contributions decreased by \$508,049. For the prior year figures, both accrued receivables and contributions increased by \$508,049 with the 2020 deficiency of revenue over expenses restated accordingly.

3. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of presentation

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for notfor-profit organizations ("ASNPO").

Revenue recognition

The Society follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Externally restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Externally restricted amounts can only be used for purposes designated by the contributor.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Program revenue is recognized when the related program services are provided with any payments received in advance of service delivery recorded as unearned revenue.

Financial instruments

All financial instruments are initially recorded at their fair market value. Publicly traded financial instruments quoted in an active market are subsequently measured at fair value with any unrealized gains or losses and transaction costs recognized in net excess (deficiency) of revenue over expenses. All other financial instruments are adjusted for any transaction costs incurred on acquisition and are subsequently measured at their amortized cost. Financial instrument impairments and impairment reversals are recognized when incurred in net excess (deficiency) of revenue over expenses.

Cash and cash equivalents

Any term deposits or similar contractual instruments that are cashable and have a maturity term of three months or less are classified as cash equivalents.

Investment

The investment is recorded at cost less an impairment allowance and has been classified as a long term asset as it is not capable of prompt liquidation. For additional details, see *Note 4*.

Capital assets

Capital assets purchased are stated at cost less accumulated amortization. Amortization is provided at various rates and methods designed to amortize the assets over the estimated useful lives as follows:

Sub-contractors expense

The sub-contractors expense represents payments made to missionaries and other Youth With A Mission organizations that perform ministry and outreach work as outlined under their contracts and agency agreements with the Society. The actual costs of the project work are the responsibility of the sub-contractors.

3. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Contributed services and materials

The Society relies on numerous volunteers to carry out its ministry. Because of the difficulty of determining the value of these services, they are not recognized in the financial statements.

Contributed materials or gifts-in-kind are only recognized when their fair value is reasonably determinable and significant, with such items recorded at fair value of the contribution. During the year, the Society received non cash gifts-in-kind of \$NIL (2020 - \$NIL).

Foreign currency translation

All monetary assets and liabilities of operations denominated in currencies other than Canadian dollars have been translated into Canadian dollars at the rate of exchange in effect at the Statement of Financial Position date. Non-monetary items are translated at historical exchange rates, unless such items are carried at market, in which case they are translated at the rate of exchange in effect at the Statement of Financial Position date. Gains and losses resulting from the translation of assets and liabilities are reflected in excess of revenue over expenses of the year.

Revenue and expense accounts are translated at the current rate of exchange at the time of the transaction.

11. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS RISKS

Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the potential that a counter party will fail to perform its obligations. The Society is exposed to credit risk for its cash deposits. Exposures to credit risk and significant changes to the risk exposure from the prior year are as follows:

 Cash held at year-end exceed the amounts covered by the Canadian Deposit Insurance Corporation, serving to increase credit risk. The Society mitigates this risk by depositing their cash a with large, high quality financial institution.

Currency risk

Currency risk is the risk that the Society's fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates due to volatility caused by external factors. The Society is exposed to currency risk and its effect on the exchange gain or loss for the year on cash held in U.S. dollar bank accounts totaling approximately \$53,750 at year-end (2020 - \$116,726).
